Not too dry, never sweet - just right!

A superbly moreish wine, full of soft juicy summer fruit flavours with a little touch of sweet red berry coulis on the finish.

Vinification

The Cinsault grapes are harvested at optimal ripeness, 100% destemmed and thereafter are divided into two sections. One passes the modern process of flash-detente and hot skin contact maceration. After that, the juice goes through cool temperature fermentation. This procedure is carried out in order to extract and enhance the Cinsaults' aromatic qualities. The other part of the grapes is traditionally fermented on the skin for about 2 days adding structure and a soft pink colour to the wine. At the end of the winemaking process both the modern and the traditional section of each variety are blended to a youthful and easy drinking Cuvée.
